


Local businessman Bert Bergstrom dressed up as Santa and handed out stockings filled with Christmas goodies for every child in town.



Barb and Larry Black's Holiday Chocolate Souffle'

2 pkgs. unflavored gelatin

1/2 c. water

2/3 c. crème de cacao

1 1/4 c. brown sugar

12 oz. pkg. semi sweet chocolate bits

8 eggs, separated

1/2 t. salt

1/2 t. cream of tartar

2 c. heavy whipped cream, whipped

1/2 c. chopped chocolate or pistachios

Sprinkle the gelatin over the water and crème de cacao in a saucepan. Add 1/2 c. of the sugar and place over low heat. Stir constantly until the gelatin and sugar are dissolved. Add the package of chocolate bits and stir until melted. Remove from heat. Beat in the

egg yolks one at a time. Cool.

In a bowl, beat the egg whites, salt, and cream of tartar until stiff but not dry. Gradually beat in the remaining sugar and continue beating until very stiff.

Fold the egg whites into the cooled gelatin mixture. Fold in the whipped cream. Turn into a 2 quart soufflé dish with a 2 inch collar or a 3 quart serving bowl. Chil several hours.

Sprinkle with pistachio nuts or chocolate. Serve and enjoy! Makes 12 to 14 servings.
